THE CONTENDER by Robert Lipsyte DUE: Thursday, August 29, for English Class

The novel titled above is your English summer reading assignment. Attached are study questions in connection with your reading. Please purchase a paperback copy of the book, which is available on-line and at most area bookstores. I encourage you to make notes in your book, highlighting significant portions of your reading to prepare for class discussions. If it fits into your summer plans, please wait until August to begin this assignment so that it remains fresh for our review. If you are too busy then to complete the assignment, by all means do it earlier, and then leave some time to go over your reading and responses before classes begin in August. On August 30, you will have an in-class write, based on your reading and your Study Questions. Therefore, be sure to make good notes.

This is a fast read as it is really a novella with subject matter that should engage you. Do give this assignment the time it deserves, however, as it will be my first impression of your English skills. Make it a good one!

1. Describe three things that Alfred learns on his first visit to the gym.

1. What differences are there between the life Alfred leads in Harlem and the one his relatives lead on Long Island? Give examples.
2. Why doesn't the author make Uncle Wilson the major influence in Alfred's life?

Chapter 5

1. What does running in the morning do for Alfred?
2. Why does he want to keep it a secret?

Chapter 6

1. Describe a few things that exist or happen at the gym which you think might become important to Alfred.

Chapter 7

1. Why is Spoon an important character to include in this novel?
2. What emotional effect does the very end of the chapter have on the reader? How does the author create this effect?

1. What has enabled Alfred to make the decision he does in response to Major's request?

Chapter 9, Chapter 10, and Chapter 11

1. Why is Aunt Pearl so upset about Alfred's new "career"?
2. What advice does Alfred get from Mr. Epstein?
3. Why does Alfred decide to go back to the clubroom?
4. Why does Alfred fall apart once he is there?

Answer the following questions on a separate sheet of paper *on top of which this sheet should be attached*. Please do on computer or write in cursive in dark blue or black ink. REMEMBER THAT LITERATURE IS DISCUSSED IN THE PRESENT TENSE.

1. A one -paragraph plot summary of the book, not to exceed 150 words. Please include the setting in this section and identify the main problem(s) faced by the character(s) in this book.
2. Choose three major characters, describe them, explaining their role in the story, their character traits, any pertinent physical description, and any other important points.
3. Pick the character who is most like you. If no one fits this description, pick the character who is most unlike you. Write three sentences giving your reasons for choosing the character you did.
4. Select one episode or scene that stands out for you. Describe briefly and explain why it is memorable.
5. Of what value do you believe this book is for readers of your age? Be honest with your evaluation of its importance, but explain, with specifics, why you think as you do.
