Dear Convent & Stuart Hall Community,

Cor Unum Week

We began our week on Monday with our K-12 adult community engaging with Generation Global to learn the essential skill of dialogue and differentiating dialogue from discussion or debate. In addition, on Monday, we brought back together the group of students and adults who participated last year during *Cor Unum* week in a two-day dialogue training to refine their skills in preparation for facilitating dialogue sessions this week across our student and adult community.

Tuesday featured our entire student and adult community joining together to see our keynote speaker, Dr. Jerry Kang. We were thrilled that he tailored a special version of his presentation so that our K-4 student community would also be engaged. I was pleased to see that so many parents were able to join us Tuesday morning as well. Wednesday and Thursday, our student community was invited to engage in the practice of dialogue as well as share their feelings and perspectives on Dr. Kang's presentation.

Friday we will close the week with a focus on how the development of an interior life (one's spirit) invites each member of the community to embrace and live into the core belief that there is a world within us and a world outside of us, and we must be able to engage and encounter both.

Looking Forward as States, Counties and Cities Begin to Loosen the Shelter-in-Place Order

As I shared in earlier communications, we engaged a consulting group specializing in infection prevention and have begun our work with them, including an extensive site visit this week. As we begin to prepare and plan our way back to being physically on campus, there are actions that we know will be necessary and campus life will not look or function exactly as it did prior to the Shelter-in-Place Order.

When the Department of Public Health Order provides the opportunity for us to be back on campus it is likely that physical distancing, masks for certain age groups and documented daily temperature checks, as well as verification that students and adults do not have any symptoms associated with the virus, will be required prior to students or adults coming onto campus.

There are a multitude of actions the school will be taking to ready our physical plant to support infection prevention. At this time, my request for all our families is that you get in the habit of checking your child's

temperature daily. When we are able to return to campus we will require that you verify (via a school form) your child's temperature is below 100 degrees and s/he has no viral symptoms. In addition, we will expect all students ages 10 and above to have a mask that they would be able to wear throughout the day and that can be washed or exchanged daily.

I am sharing this request to practice habits that will allow us, when the time comes, to be back on campus. For now we continue to appreciate all that we are able to do remotely and how we are able to still engage as a community, even with a Shelter-in-Place Order. Yesterday, Stuart Hall for Boys' Congé proved just how vibrant our community is - congratulations SHB!

We have a great opportunity to celebrate community this weekend with the 50th running of Miller's Mile this Saturday. I hope to see you join in the fun.
